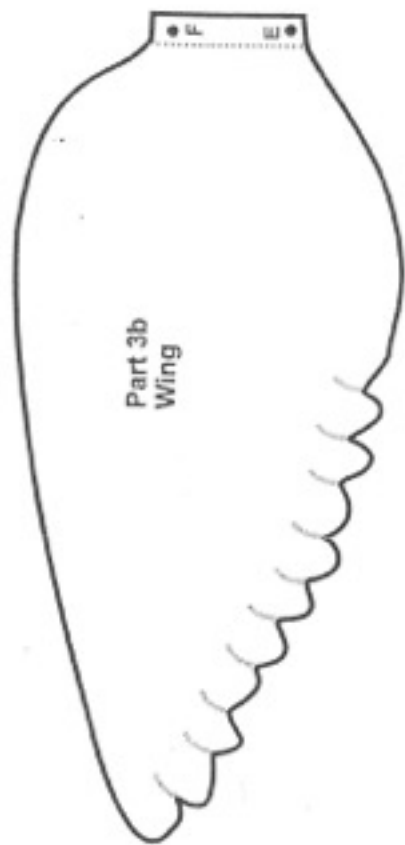
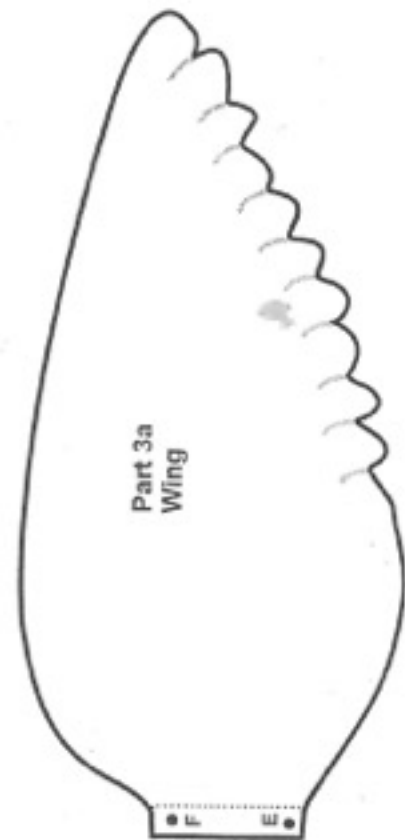
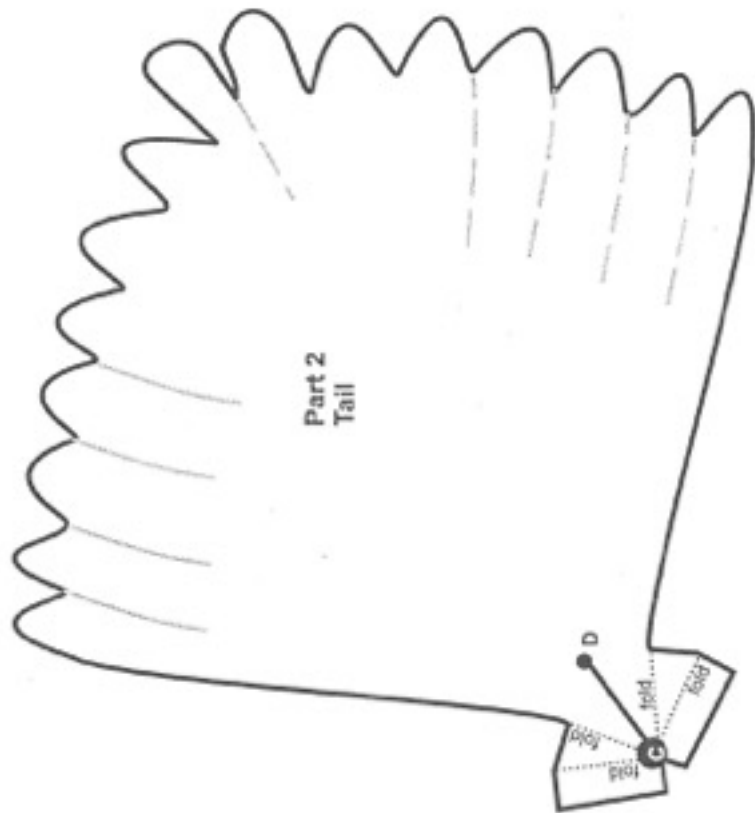
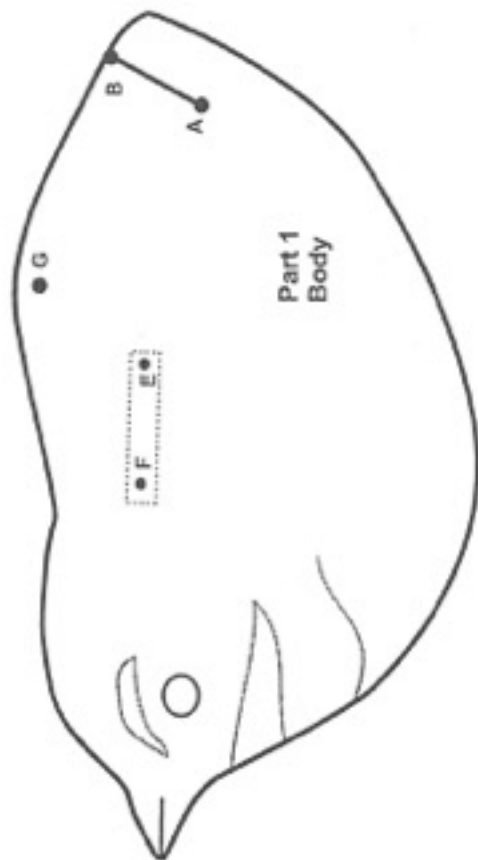
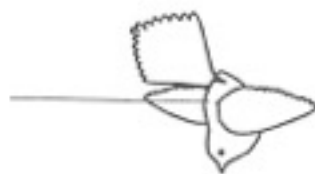


# • MAKE A FANTAIL

## Instructions for making Fantail

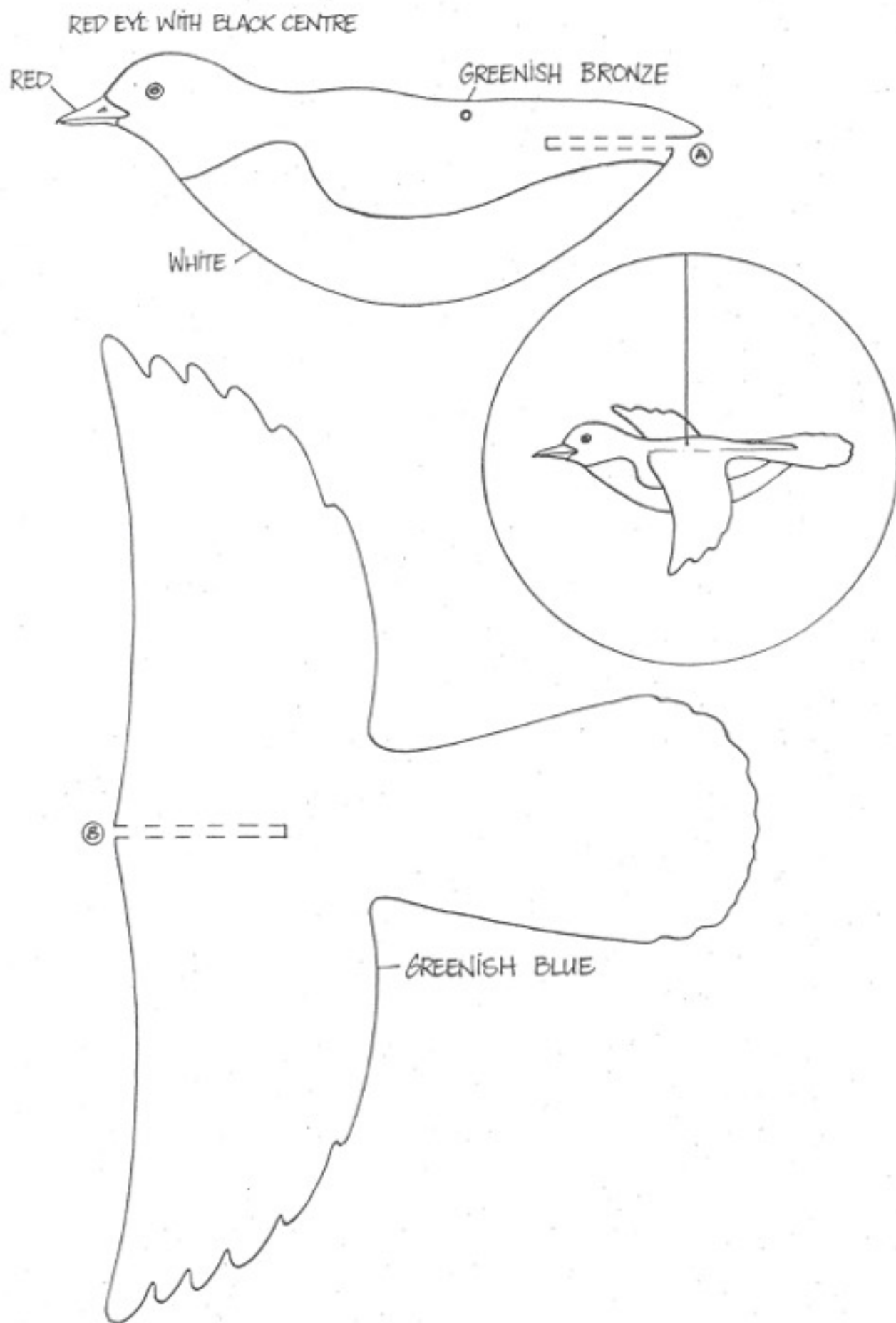
1. Cut out the pattern pieces and trace them onto a sheet of cardboard.  
Keep the original pattern to help you follow the assembly instructions.
2. Cut out and colour in the cardboard sections.
3. Cut line CD on Part 2 (tail)
4. Fold the tabs on Part 2 and join parts 1 and 2 so that A meets D
5. Glue the tabs to Part 1
6. Fold down the tabs on wing Parts 3a and 3b
7. Glue the wings on either side of the body, matching the points E and F
8. Pierce a hole at G
9. Tie a string through this hole and suspend your flying fantail from a window, or make several and create a mobile



# Make your own NZ Pigeon

## Instructions

Glue this page onto thin card. Colour the pigeon, cut out the two pieces and slide slit A into slit B. Attach thread as shown in the diagram to hang your flying pigeon.



# LEAF PRINTS

Leaf prints can be used to decorate walls or books. They also provide a good way of recording the various types of trees in your neighbourhood. Most trees can be identified just by the shape of the leaf.

## LEAF RUBBING

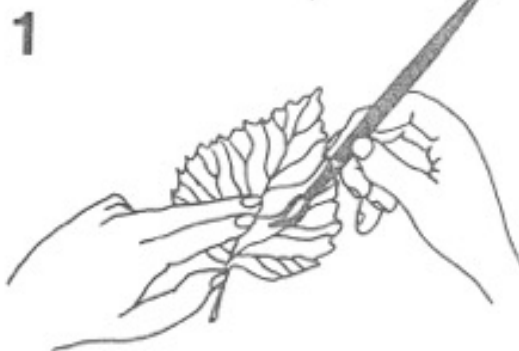


1 Place a leaf on card or board and lay a firm piece of paper over the top.



2 Rub a wax crayon over the paper with even strokes. The leaf veins and ribs will appear quite clearly, especially if a hard, dry leaf is chosen.

## LEAF OUTLINE

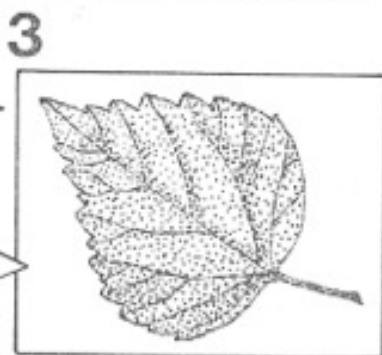
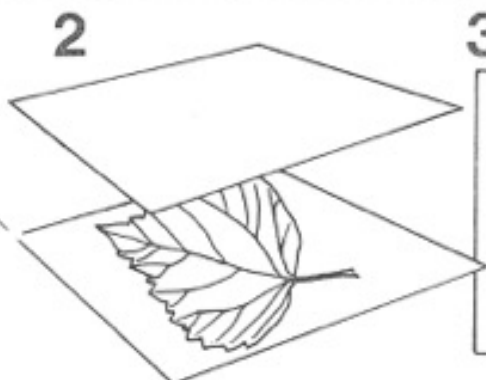


1 Lay a leaf on a sheet of paper and hold it firmly with two fingers. Use a fairly thick paint brush and brush paint from the edge of your leaf onto the paper.



When you have finished remove the leaf. An outline of the leaf will remain.

## LEAF PRINT



Spread colour (oil paint or shoe polish) on the back of a leaf. Place the leaf on a sheet of paper with the painted side down. Cover with a piece of blotting paper and rub gently but firmly. Remove the blotting paper and the leaf.
